

§ 33-1. Emergency Services Board Appropriations.

DIRECTOR — The Director of the Kent County Office of Emergency Services.

EMS — Emergency medical services.

EMS COUNCIL — The organization known as "Kent County Emergency Medical Services Council," whose membership consists of a representative from each of the EMS services in Kent County and one from the County's EMS.

- B. Emergency Services Board.
 - (1) The County Commissioners of Kent County shall establish an Emergency Services Board, which shall consist of five members:
 - (a) Membership.
 - [1] A representative from the Chief's CHIEFS' Association, who shall be appointed by the Chief's CHIEFS' Association and shall serve for a one-year term;
 - [2] A representative from the EMS Council, who shall be appointed by the EMS Council and shall serve for a one-year term;
 - [3] A citizen, who shall be appointed by the County Commissioners and shall act as Chairman of the Board. The citizen shall be a resident of Kent County, Maryland, shall have no current affiliation with a fire or EMS company, shall have leadership skills, and shall serve for a three-year term;
 - [4] A citizen attorney, who shall be appointed by the County Commissioners. The citizen attorney shall be a member of the bar of the State of Maryland; shall be a

- resident of Kent County, Maryland or shall maintain an active office in Kent County for the practice of law; shall have no current affiliation with a fire or EMS company; and shall serve for a three-year term; and
- [5] The Director of the Kent County Office of Emergency Services, who shall serve as long as he or she is the Director.
- (b) Notwithstanding the above, there shall not be more than one member from each respective fire company and rescue squad on the Board.
- (c) A quorum of the Board shall be a majority of all members thereof.
- (d) The Board, subject to the approval of the County Commissioners, may from time to time employ or contract with such personnel as the Board may consider necessary to properly administer the functions of the Board.
- (2) All Board members may be reappointed to the Board after serving their term.
- (3) The Board shall approve and enforce County-wide policies and standards for fire protection services and emergency medical services.
- (4) The Board shall have authority to withhold funding from any fire or EMS company in order to ensure compliance with approved standards. The Board's authority in this regard shall be exercised as follows: From the date of the adoption of a policy or one or more standards by the Board, each fire and EMS company will have one year to come into reasonable compliance WITHIN THE TIME SET FORTH BY THE KENT COUNTY CHIEFS' ASSOCIATION OR THE KENT COUNTY EMS COUNCIL. SUCH TIME SHALL BE EITHER THIRTY DAYS, SIXTY DAYS, OR NINETY DAYS. If at the end of one year THE TIME SET FORTH BY THE KENT COUNTY CHIEFS' ASSOCIATION OR THE KENT COUNTY EMS COUNCIL a company is not compliant with the Board's policies and/or standards, the Board shall withhold 5% of the noncompliant company's funds and will appoint a review committee to determine strategies to bring the company into compliance. If at the end of the second year TIME SET FORTH BY THE KENT COUNTY CHIEFS' ASSOCIATION OR THE KENT COUNTY EMS COUNCIL the company is still not in compliance, the Board will withhold 10% of the company's funds and will appoint a review committee to provide an alternative recommendation to the Board in order to ensure compliance.
- (5) The Board shall evaluate the **FIRE AND** EMS system annually, and shall make recommendations as appropriate to the County Commissioners regarding updates and improvements to the system. These recommendations may include, but are not limited to, staffing, priority dispatch, billing, evaluation of system progress, and the delivery of **FIRE AND** EMS Countywide.
- (6) The Board may establish bylaws, procedures, and rules to facilitate carrying out its mission and responsibilities.

C. Authorization.

(1) The County Commissioners are hereby authorized and directed, each and every year, to appropriate .0322 per \$100 of the value of the assessable real property as set by the State

- Department of Assessments and Taxation (full-year levy) for the use and benefit of the fire companies, ambulance companies, rescue squads, and/or other public safety providers.
- (2) The sum so appropriated shall be in lieu of any and all other funds to be paid by the County to or on behalf of the fire companies, ambulance companies, rescue squads, and/or other public safety providers.

D. Allocation of funds.

- (1) All such funds appropriated by the County Commissioners pursuant to the above subsection shall be designated for the use of fire protection services, for the use of emergency medical services, and/or for both as determined by the Board.
- (2) The Chief's CHIEFS' Association shall allocate among the fire companies, rescue squads, and/or other public safety service providers all of those funds designated for the use of services relating to fire protection services. If the Chief's CHIEFS' Association is unable to agree on an appropriate allocation in a timely manner, then the Board shall allocate the funds.
- (3) The EMS Council shall allocate among the fire companies, rescue squads, and/or other public safety service providers all of those funds designated for the use of services related to the provision of emergency medical services. If the EMS Council is unable to agree on an appropriate allocation in a timely manner, then the Board shall allocate the funds.
- (4) The Board shall allocate among the fire companies, rescue squads, and/or other public safety service providers all of those funds designated for the use of services related to the provision of both fire protection services and emergency medical services.
- (5) In the event that the Board cannot agree on the appropriate allocation or distribution of funds, the County Commissioners may withhold funding.

§ 33-2. Vehicles.

The Fire Chief, his two Chief Deputies or his designated fire police of each volunteer fire company in Kent County may have their vehicles equipped with amber lights or signal devices designed to emit an oscillating, rotating, blinking or other type of emission of light. The lights or signal devices may be flashed or oscillated or otherwise used only while en route to or at the scene of an accident, flood or other emergency to which the volunteer fire company is responding. In addition, the Fire Chief, his two Chief Deputies or his designated fire police may flash, oscillate or otherwise use blue lights only at the scene of an accident, flood or other emergency.

- A. IN EACH VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY, NO MORE THAN FIVE OF THE FOLLOWING OFFICERS MAY HAVE THEIR PRIVATELY OWNED VEHICLES EQUIPPED WITH RED OR RED AND WHITE LIGHTS OR SIGNAL DEVICES, WHICH MAY BE DISPLAYED ONLY WHILE IN ROUTE TO OR AT THE SCENE OF AN EMERGENCY:
 - (1) THE FIRE CHIEF OR THE HIGHEST-RANKING OFFICER;
 - (2) ONE OR MORE OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEFS OR DEPUTY CHIEFS, WHICHEVER RANK IS SECOND IN COMMAND; AND
 - (3) THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES COMMANDER.

B. THE FIRE POLICE OF EACH VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY MAY HAVE THEIR PRIVATELY OWNED VEHICLES EQUIPPED WITH RED, RED AND GREEN, OR RED

AND WHITE LIGHTS OR SIGNAL DEVICES DESIGNED TO EMIT AN OSCILLATING, ROTATING, BLINKING, OR OTHER TYPE OF EMISSION LIGHT.

C. THE LIGHTS OR SIGNAL DEVICES MAY BE FLASHED OR OSCILLATED OR OTHERWISE USED ONLY WHILE THE VEHICLE IS AT THE SCENE OF AN ACCIDENT, FLOOD, OR OTHER EMERGENCY TO WHICH THE VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY IS RESPONDING.

I am thrilled to introduce the Maryland Economic Development Association's 2023-2024 Year in Review, a powerful summary of what our state's economic development community has achieved in the past 12 months.

In our first year, we made incredible progress moving Maryland forward, including announcing the creation of 39,000 new jobs; raising the minimum wage; launching the Service Year Option, and helping 34,000 children move up the socioeconomic ladder. The Baltimore metropolitan region was named a federal Tech Hub, unlocking new opportunities for tens of millions of dollars in federal funds to support our innovation economy. And the long-awaited decision to build the new FBI headquarters in Prince George's County will bring 7,500 jobs to the state and produce over \$4 billion in economic activity.

In our second year, we passed landmark legislation to make housing in Maryland more affordable and strengthen rights for Maryland renters, critical steps that will not only help working Marylanders increase their economic mobility but will help us attract new business and investment to the state. We also passed bills to make our state more competitive by helping us attract technology projects such as data centers and by requiring state agencies to provide more transparency in their licensing and permitting process—which will provide much-needed predictability for entrepreneurs and growing businesses.

Of course, Maryland also faced an unexpected challenge this spring with the shocking and tragic collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore. We immediately mobilized a massive recovery effort, provided several avenues of support for impacted businesses, and worked closely with our partners to ensure the wreckage was removed as quickly as possible. Though we mourn with the families of the six men who lost their lives, I am incredibly proud of how Maryland has responded to the tragedy and am proud to say that the Port of Baltimore has fully reopened.

I'm grateful to each and every member of our economic development community for your hard work and dedication to make this Maryland's decade. I look forward to the great things we'll accomplish together in the years to come.

Dear MEDA Team,

It's once again my great pleasure to introduce the Maryland Economic Development Association's 2023-2024 Year in Review, which offers a summary not only of our state's recent economic development achievements, but of the hard work and dedication of people like you.

It's been an eventful year, to say the least. We announced major expansion and location wins, including Conair's new distribution center in Washington County, Rocket Lab's new manufacturing site in Baltimore County, EV APCO's expansion in Carroll County, and the relocation of Blink Charging's headquarters to Prince George's County.

The Maryland Department of Commerce has continued to attract foreign investment to our state, and recently launched the fifth round of applications for the Maryland Global Gateway Soft Landing Program, which has helped dozens of international companies land in Maryland so they can explore the U.S. market.

During this year's General Assembly session, lawmakers approved Commerce's proposal to add an important new capability to the Small-, Minority-, and Women-Owned Business Account. Our fund managers for this program can now offer grants in conjunction with loans, giving Commerce another tool with which to support small businesses across the state.

Commerce also mobilized to support our business community after the sudden collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in March. Commerce's Port of Baltimore Emergency Business Assistance Program made \$15 million available to businesses whose operations and shipments were primarily reliant on the Port of Baltimore. As the program draws to a close, we expect to have provided funds to more than 100 businesses whose operations were hindered or halted by the temporarily reduced operations at the Port.

In the coming months, Commerce will continue to work with our partners at the Maryland Economic Development Commission on a new strategic plan to guide our agency's efforts to support economic growth and job creation in the coming years. We've been seeking input from our partners across the state during this process, and look forward to sharing the new plan with you soon.

Thank you all for your hard work throughout the year and your continued support of economic development in Maryland. Great things lie ahead!

Dear Commissioners:

We have been advised by Atlantic Security that the current access control system for the courthouse is obsolete and needs to be replaced. The enclosed email from Atlantic provides more detail. Essentially, the existing system was discontinued by the manufacturer in 2021. Replacement parts are no longer available for repairs. In the event of a power surge, or a Google Chrome update, the system could be rendered inoperable and doors in the courthouse could become locked with no way to open them.

Atlantic is recommending replacement with the ProDataKey system. I believe this is the same system that has been installed at 400 High Street and Public Safety. The estimate for that replacement is enclosed. Please consider this the Court's request for approval to move ahead with replacement.

Regarding costs, we have discussed this situation with the Administrative Office of the Court Security Division. They indicate this would qualify for reimbursement as a Tier 1 security need under their annual grant program. However, they cannot give official approval until all grants are submitted and reviewed. That process should begin later this month.

COMMERCIAL PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY ("MDPACE") AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into as of this <u>1</u>st day of October, 2024, between Kent County, Maryland, a political subdivision of the State of Maryland (the "County"), and the Maryland Clean Energy Center, a body politic and corporate and a public instrumentality of the State of Maryland ("MCEC").

RECITALS

- 1. A Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy program is a program to facilitate loan financing for clean energy improvements to commercial properties by utilizing a state or local tax assessment mechanism to provide security for repayment of the loans.
- 2. Pursuant to §1-1102 of the Act (as defined below), counties and municipalities may enact ordinances or resolutions to establish a clean energy loan program.
- 3. The County has authorized and established a commercial property assessed clean energy loan program (the Clean Energy Loan Program" or "PACE Program" or "MDPACE Program") pursuant to §152-30, 152-31, and 152-32 of the Code of Public Laws of Kent County, Maryland (the "Code"), as established by Code Home Rule Bill 6-2024, attached hereto as Exhibit 1 (the "CHR 6-2024").
- 4. §152-32.2 of the Code permits the County to enter into an agreement with a PACE Program Administrator.
- 5. MCEC agrees to work with the County to implement the MDPACE Program and to obtain financing for the Program.
- 6. To secure financing for the program, MCEC and the County are authorized by §152-31 of the Code to enter into a written agreement pursuant to which the County has agreed to assess and collect, remit and assign surcharges to MCEC in return for Qualifying Projects for Commercial Property Owners within the County and for costs reasonably incurred by the County in performing those duties.

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth in this Agreement, for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are acknowledged, and in order to effectuate the purposes of § 152-32.2 of the Code, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I DEFINITIONS

- (a) *Act* means §§1-1101 et seq. of the Local Government Article.
- (b) Clean Energy Lender means a capital provider that provides loans to Property Owners to finance Qualifying Projects, approved by MCEC, and such capital provider's successors, transferees, and assignees.
- (c) Clean Energy Loan means any loan made by a Clean Energy Lender to a Property Owner under the Clean Energy Loan Program.
- (d) Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement means an agreement between a Property Owner and a Clean Energy Lender providing for the terms and conditions of a Clean Energy Loan.
- (e) Clean Energy Loan Program or PACE Program or MDPACE Program means pursuant to §152-30, 152-31, and 152-32 of the Code of Public Laws of Kent County, Maryland (the "Code"), as established by Code Home Rule Bill 6-2024, attached hereto as Exhibit 1 (the "CHR 6-2024")., the purpose of which is to provide loans to Property Owners to finance Qualifying Projects.
- (f) Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator means any person or entity selected by the County to manage the Clean Energy Loan Program.
- (g) Commercial Property means any real property as defined in §1-1101(d) of the Act, including residential dwellings containing more than four single dwelling units.
- (h) Local Government Article means the Local Government Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, as it may be amended.
- (i) Clean Energy Loan Program means the clean energy loan program authorized by the Act and established by \$152-30 of the Code, the purpose of which is to provide loans to Property Owners to finance Qualifying Projects.
 - (j) **Property Owner means the owner of qualified Commercial Property.**
 - (k) Qualifying Projects means projects as defined in the ordinance of Kent County.
- (l) Surcharge means the assessment levied by the County on a Property Owner's property tax bill to collect PACE Program loan payments owed to a Clean Energy Lender by the Property Owner and costs of administering the PACE Program in accordance with the Act and as authorized by §152-31 of the Code.
- (m) *Surcharge Lien* means the lien automatically established upon the County's levy of the Surcharge on the property tax bill.

ARTICLE 2 OBLIGATIONS OF MCEC

Pursuant to this Agreement, MCEC will have the following obligations:

(a) Program Requirements.

- 1. Shall develop program guidelines governing the terms and conditions under which a Property Owner may access a PACE Program loan from a Clean Energy Lender, pursuant to the Act and §152-30 of the Code.
- 2. Shall receive and review applications submitted by Property Owners within the County for financing of Qualifying Projects and approve or disapprove each application in accordance with underwriting procedures and requirements established by MCEC and in accordance with State law.
- 3. Shall prepare and deliver to the County an annual report which shall contain information related to the PACE Program within the County, including:
- (i) A list of each Commercial Property for which the Property Owner executed a Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement during the prior year.

A. A list of each Commercial Property where all obligations under the Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement have been satisfied or paid in full during the prior year, including the satisfaction date and a copy of the notice of satisfaction, if required; and

- (ii) For each unpaid Surcharge:
 - A. The date of the Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement.
- B. The total principal balance and accrued interest outstanding on the clean energy loan; and
- C. The annual payment(s) due, which shall include principal and accrued interest (including the amount of accrued interest on the initial payment, if different), and the fees for the costs of administering the PACE Program.
 - (b) <u>Project Requirements. If a Property Owner requests approval from MCEC for Oualifying Projects, MCEC shall:</u>
- 1. Require proof that the Property Owner owns 100% of the interests in the property located in Kent County for which Qualifying Projects are proposed.
- 2. Require that the Property Owner demonstrate that the proposed project is consistent with the requirements of the Act and § 152-30 of the Code and is a Qualifying Project.

- 3. Impose requirements and criteria to ensure that the proposed energy improvements are consistent with the purpose of the PACE Program.
- 4. Require that the Property Owner, prior to the execution of the Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, provide a copy of the written notice to all current holders of a mortgage or deed of trust who have a priority recorded lien on the property and written proof of express consent by all current holders of a mortgage or deed of trust on the Commercial Property to the PACE Program loan, along with an acknowledgement of the priority of the Surcharge Lien;
- 5. Require that the Clean Energy Lender demonstrate to MCEC that the Property Owner is able to repay the loan under the lender's underwriting standards which are substantially similar to the criteria set forth in the Act and \$152-32 of the Code; and
- 6. Require the Property Owner to provide proof that all outstanding property truces, assessments, and charges have been paid.

(c) Financing Agreement for Project.

- 1. A Clean Energy Lender may provide financing to a Property Owner to finance Qualifying Projects, which loan will be non-accelerating and will survive a change of ownership, whether voluntary or involuntary.
- 2. Each Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement shall dearly state the final Surcharge that will be levied against the PACE Program Commercial Property.
- 3. Each Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement shall contain a Disclosures and Risks Form executed by the Property Owner.
- 4. Upon the submission of a Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement to MCEC by a Clean Energy Lender and Property Owner with an approved project, MCEC shall (i) establish the Surcharge, including all fees for the operation of the PACE Program, and (ii) provide a Notice to the County to Commence Levy and Collection of Surcharges for a Clean Energy Loan Program, which notice shall contain a copy of the PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement and the Payment Schedule. If the County has semi-annual billing for real property taxes, the Surcharge shall be payable in two equal payments respectively payable on September 30 and December 31 of each year so that they are due at the same time as the installments of the County's real property taxes. If the County changes its practices concerning the billing of annual real property taxes as to the number of installments and their due dates, MCEC will change its practices to the extent possible to correspond with the County's practices.

(d) Levy of Surcharge.

1. Upon receiving written notice from MCEC that a PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement has been executed, MCEC, MCEC's Agent, or the Clean Energy Lender shall file a Notice of Levy and Lien of Surcharge in the County land records.

ARTICLE 3 OBLIGATIONS OF THE COUNTY

(a) Surcharge Billing, Collection and Disbursement to MCEC.

- 1. The County shall select, within thirty (30) days of the date of this Agreement, a PACE Program coordinator within the tax collector's office who will assist in Surcharge assessments and collection as set forth in this Agreement.
- 2. The County shall bill the Surcharge due by a Property Owner on the first tax bill after the Program Administrator provides written notice to the County's PACE Program coordinator of the PACE Program agreement's repayment schedule. The County shall add a Surcharge to its real property tax bill(s) and shall send a copy of the tax bill containing the Surcharge to MCEC within 30 days of the County's initial tax billing.
- 3. The purpose of the Surcharge is to repay the clean energy loan under the PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement and to cover costs to operate the PACE Program. The Surcharge shall be a separate clearly defined line item or separate bill and shall be due on the same date(s) as the County's real property taxes. The amount of the Surcharge will be recorded on the County's tax rolls in the same manner as any other tax, such that the public will have access to its existence and payment status. The penalties and interest on delinquent Surcharges shall be charged in the same manner and rate as the County charges for delinquent real property taxes. Once the obligation to assess, levy, collect and disburse Surcharge payments to MCEC is triggered, the obligation survives termination and/or opting out of this Agreement by the County.
- (i) Surcharges collected by the County shall be segregated from all other funds of the County and deposited into a separate account for the benefit of MCEC and identifying MCEC or its trustee as the beneficial owner. The County disclaims any ownership interest or other interests in such account, or the amount collected.
- (ii) The County shall pay all amounts collected within any calendar month to MCEC no later than thirty (30) days after the month that the amounts are collected. The County will provide collection reports to MCEC, and MCEC, at its own expense, shall have the right to audit the records relating to the Surcharges upon reasonable notice at reasonable times. MCEC and the County agree to provide each other with information as they may reasonably request. MCEC and the County agree to provide such information in a computer format satisfactory to the other. Reported information may include data necessary for MCEC to

include in its annual report required by this Agreement. Required information shall not include information which is deemed confidential information by law or any proprietary or confidential information from loan applicants or relating to the underwriting of any particular PACE Program loan. The County shall not disclose any information contained in the books and records of MCEC, except as may be required by any applicable law.

- (b) Levy of Surcharge. Within sixty (60) days following execution of a PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, the County shall add the Surcharge to the real property tax bill. The Surcharge levied pursuant to this Agreement, State Code, and § I 52-31.c of the Code, and the interest, fees and any penalties thereon shall constitute a lien against the Commercial Property on which they are made until they are paid. The Surcharge Lien shall be levied and collected in the same manner as the property taxes of the County on real property, including, in the event of default or delinquency, with respect to any penalties, fees and remedies and lien priorities as provided by the Code and State law.
- (c) <u>Collections.</u> Upon the written a failure of a Property Owner to pay a Surcharge within the appropriate timeframe, the County shall institute a tax lien collection pursuant to State law. Funds collected from a tax sale of a Commercial Property subject to a Surcharge shall be paid to MCEC or MCEC's Agent, its trustee, successors, assignees or any other entity or person that MCEC or MCEC's Agent designates in writing to receive payment as set forth in Section (a)(3) above.
- (d) <u>Delinquencies.</u> In the event that any Property Owner fails to make a Surcharge payment when due in any property tax billing cycle, the County shall provide written notice to MCEC of such delinquency within thirty (30) days.
- (e) Amendment of the Surcharge Amount. Pursuant to the PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, the final amount of the Surcharge may be adjusted after the levy of the Surcharge Lien. Such an adjustment would likely be the result of a change in the energy improvement service contract amount during the construction period, a change in the amount of capitalized interest, or an amendment to the PACE Program Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement. In the event that the final Surcharge amount needs to be adjusted at the completion of the project, or any other time, MCEC will inform the County of the change, provide the County with an updated payment schedule and new Surcharge amount, and the County shall amend the Surcharge Lien to reflect the adjustment.

(f) PACE Program Administration Costs.

- 1. The County may include an administration fee to cover their costs that will be collected by the MDPACE program and remitted to the county. Reimbursable costs and expenses include reasonable costs incurred by the County in conjunction with any and all proceedings to collect and enforce the Surcharges and delinquent Surcharges, including foreclosure proceedings.
- 2. The County will provide written notice to MCEC prior to any sale or assignment of its real property taxes or any institution of a judicial foreclosure or other

proceeding against any real property for delinquent real property taxes if such real property is subject to a delinquent Surcharge.

ARTICLE 4 TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon the date the last party executes the Agreement. This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until all the Surcharges levied by the County have been paid in full or deemed no longer outstanding. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time upon ninety (90) days' advance written notice to the other party, provided that the County's obligations to collect Surcharges for PACE Program Clean Energy Loan made prior to the termination date shall continue until all Surcharges (including the interest, penalties, and fees thereon) have been collected and that all such PACE Program Clean Energy Loans have been paid in full.

ARTICLE 5 DEFAULT

Each party shall give the other party written notice of any breach of any covenant, provision or term under this Agreement and shall allow the defaulting party thirty (30) days from the date of its receipt of such notice within which to cure any such default or, if it cannot be cured within the thirty (30) days, to commence and thereafter diligently attempt to cure, using good faith efforts to effect such cure and to thereafter notify the other party of the actual cure of any such default. The parties shall have all other equitable rights and remedies provided by law, including, but not limited to, specific performance.

ARTICLE 6 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

(a) <u>Assignment or Transfer by County.</u> The County may not assign or transfer its rights or obligations under this Agreement without prior written consent of MCEC.

MCEC Agent. The County acknowledges and agrees that MCEC may employ a third party to undertake MCEC's obligations under this Agreement, subject to approval by the County (an "MCEC Agent"). In the event that MCEC employs an MCEC Agent, MCEC will notify the County in writing of the name and contact information of the MCEC Agent. The County agrees that that for purposes of this Agreement, the MCEC Agent shall speak and act for MCEC and that any notices required under the terms of this Agreement to be sent to MCEC shall also be sent to the MCEC Agent. In the event that MCEC is to be dissolved, MCEC may assign and transfer its rights under this Agreement to the MCEC Agent, subject to the County's right to terminate this Agreement under Article 4.

- (b) This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and shall be binding upon, each of the parties and their successors and permitted assigns.
- (c) <u>Amendment/Termination/Waiver.</u> This Agreement may not be amended or terminated by the parties without the prior approval of the Clean Energy Lender for any PACE Program Clean Energy Loan. Any waiver of any provision of this Agreement must be in writing and mutually agreed to by MCEC and the County. Except for the specific provision of the Agreement, which is amended, the Agreement remains in full force and effect after such amendment and is subject to the same laws, obligations, conditions, provisions, rules, and regulations, as it was before the amendment.
- (d) <u>Severability.</u> If any clause, provision, or section of this Agreement is held to be illegal or invalid by any court, the invalidity of the clause, provision or section will not affect any of the remaining clauses, provisions or sections, and this Agreement will be construed and enforced as if the illegal or invalid clause, provision or section has not been contained in it.
- (e) <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, and all of which together shall constitute but one and the same instrument.
- (f) <u>Notices.</u> All notices, requests, consents, and other communications shall be in writing and shall be delivered, mailed by first class mail, postage prepaid, hand delivered, or overnight delivery service, to the parties, as follows:

(g) <u>Applicable Law and Venue.</u> This Agreement shall be construed, interpreted, and enforced according to the laws of the State of Maryland. Any claim brought in connection with this Agreement must be brought in the State Courts of Maryland and the parties' consent to the jurisdiction of the State Courts of Maryland.

- (h) <u>Headings.</u> The headings in this Agreement are solely for convenience, do not constitute a part of this Agreement, and do not affect its meaning or construction.
- (i) <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties and supersedes all previous discussions, understandings and agreements between the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement.
- (j) Nothing in this Agreement, and no act of the County or MCEC, shall be deemed to create any relationship of third-party beneficiary, principal, and agent, limited or general partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship between the County and MCEC.

A BILL ENTITLED CHR 6-2024 CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM

<u>SECTION 1.</u> NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF KENT COUNTY, MARYLAND, that Chapter 152, Article VII, is hereby amended as follows:

ARTICLE VII CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM

§152-30. Clean Energy Loan Program.

- (A) Definitions. In this subsection **SUBTITLE**, the following words have the meanings indicated:
 - (1) "ACT" MEANS §§1-1101 ET. SEQ. OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED STATE CODE OF MARYLAND.
 - (2) "Clean Energy Financing Agreement" means an agreement between a property owner and a Clean Energy Lender providing for the terms and conditions of a Clean Energy Loan.
 - (3) "Clean Energy Lender" means a private lender providing a clean energy loan. A CAPITAL PROVIDER THAT PROVIDES LOANS TO PROPERTY OWNERS TO FINANCE QUALIFYING PROJECTS, APPROVED BY MARYLAND CLEAN ENERGY CENTER, AND SUCH CAPITAL PROVIDER'S SUCCESSORS, TRANSFERESS, AND ASSIGNEES.
 - (4) "Clean Energy Loan" means any loan made by a **CLEAN ENERGY** private Lender to a property owner under the Clean Energy Loan Program.
 - (5) "Clean Energy Loan Obligation" means all indebtedness and obligations of a property owner to a Clean Energy Lender under a Clean Energy Financing Agreement.
 - (6) "Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator" means any person or entity selected by the County to manage the Clean Energy Loan Program.
 - (7) "Commercial Property" has the meaning stated in the Local Government Article, §§

- 1-1101-et.-seq., of the State-Code. THIS MEANS ANY REAL PROPERTY AS DEFINED IN THE ACT, INCLUDING RESIDENTIAL DWELLINGS CONTAINING MORE THAN FOUR SINGLE-DWELLING UNITS.
- (8) "Property Owner" means an **THE** owner of **QUALIFIED** commercial property. as defined-in-this-subsection.
- (9) "LOCAL GOVERNMENT ARTICLE" MEANS THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, AS IT MAY BE AMENDED.
- (10) "QUALIFYING PROJECTS" MEANS PROJECTS AS DEFINED IN THE ORDINANCE FOR KENT COUNTY.
- (11) "SURCHARGE" MEANS THE ASSESSMENT LEVIED BY THE COUNTY ON A PROPERTY OWNER'S PROPERTY TAX BILL TO COLLECT CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM PAYMENTS OWED TO A CLEAN ENERGY LENDER BY THE PROPERTY OWNER AND COSTS OF ADMINISTERING THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ACT AND AS AUTHORIZED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATION.
- (12) "SURCHARGE LIEN" MEANS THE LIEN AUTOMATICALLY ESTABLISHED UPON THE COUNTY'S LEVY OF THE SURCHARGE ON THE PROPERTY TAX BILL.
- (B) Program. There is a Clean Energy Loan Program to finance energy efficiency projects and renewable energy-projects with an electric generating capacity of not more than 100 kilowatts. QUALIFYING PROJECTS AS PROVIDED IN THE ACT.
- (C) Rules and Regulations. The Director of Finance may adopt rules and regulations to administer the Clean Energy Loan Program consistent with this subtitle.
- (D) Program Administrator. The County Commissioners of Kent County may enter into an agreement with a private entity **OR STATE INSTRUMENTALITY** to administer the Clean Energy Loan Program.
- (E) Scope. Commercial property owners are eligible to participate in the Clean Energy Loan Program for non-accelerating loans greater than \$25,000.
- (F) Eligibility. In order to be eligible for a Clean Energy Loan, the property owner shall:
 - (1) Have a 100% ownership interest in the property located in Kent County for which improvements-PROJECTS are being made; PROPOSED.
 - (2) Demonstrate that the most recent property taxes, assessments, and charges on the property

have been paid;

- (3) Provide a copy of written notice to all current holders of a mortgage or deed of trust who have a priority recorded lien on the property and written proof of express consent to the Clean Energy Loan as a priority lien by all current holders of a mortgage or deed of trust on the property THAT IS TO BE FINANCED UNDER THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM; and
- (4) Establish that the owner of the commercial property is able to repay the loan provided under the Clean Energy Loan Program, in a manner substantially similar to that required for a mortgage loan under §§ 12-127, 12-311, 12-409.1, 12- 925, and 12-1029 of the Commercial Law Article of the ANNOTATED State Code OF MARYLAND.
- (G) Qualifying Improvements. The following improvements, either new or replacement, qualify as energy efficiency or renewable energy projects under the Clean Energy Loan Program:
 - (1) solar energy equipment; ENERGY AND WATER EFFICIENCY PROJECTS;
 - (2) RENEWABLE ENERGY PROJECTS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO SOLAR ENERGY EQUIPMENT, geothermal energy devices, AND WIND ENERGY SYSTEMS:
 - (3) wind-energy-systems; ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION PROJECTS, WHICH MEANS A PROJECT INTENDED TO REMOVE ENVIRONMENTAL OR HEALTH HAZARDS, AND INCLUDING PROJECTS THAT PROMOTE INDOOR AIR AND WATER QUALITY, ASBESTOS REMEDIATION, LEAD PAINT REMOVAL, AND MOLD REMEDIATION;
 - (4) water-conservation devices not required by law; RESILIENCY PROJECTS, WHICH MEANS A PROJECT INTENDED TO INCREASE THE CAPACITY OF A PROPERTY TO WITHSTAND NATURAL DISASTERS AND THE EFFECTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE, INCLUDING FLOOD MITIGATION, STORMWATER MANAGEMENT, A PROJECT TO INCREASE FIRE OR WIND RESISTANCE, A PROJECT TO INCREASE THE CAPACITY OF A NATURAL SYSTEM, AN INUNDATION ADAPTATION PROJECT, ALTERNATIVE VEHICLE CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE, AND ENERGY STORAGE; AND
 - (5) Any construction, renovation or retrofitting of commercial property to reduce energy consumption, including, high efficiency lighting and building systems, heating ventilation air conditioning (hvac) upgrades, high efficiency boilers and furnaces, high efficiency hot water heating systems, combustion and burner upgrades, fuel switching, heat recovery and steam traps, building shell or envelope improvements, fenestration improvements, building energy management systems, and process equipment upgrades; and
 - (6 5) Any other improvement **PROJECT** approved by the County or the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator as qualifying as an energy efficiency project or renew able energy

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project. CONSISTENT WITH THE ACT.

(H) Qualifying Costs. A Clean Energy Loan may be used to pay for all costs incurred by a property owner in connection with the qualifying improvements, including, **BUT NOT LIMITED TO**, the cost of the energy audit; feasibility studies and reports; project management, design, installation, and construction of the qualifying improvements **PROJECTS**; commissioning; energy savings or performance guaranty or insurance; building accreditation; closing costs of the Clean Energy Loan; permitting fees; administrative fees; **AND** post-install evaluation, measurement & **AND** verification; and, building accreditation.

§152-31. Real Property Tax Surcharge.

- (A) Repayment of Loans. A property owner participating in the Clean Energy Loan Program shall repay the Clean Energy Loan through a surcharge on their real property tax bill. Upon receipt of written notice from the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator of the execution of a Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, the County shall, within sixty (60) days from the date of the Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, add the surcharge to the tax property bill. The surcharge shall constitute a first lien on the property from the date it becomes payable until the unpaid surcharge and interest and penalties on the surcharge are paid in full, regardless of a change in ownership, whether voluntary or involuntary. A person or entity that acquires property subject to a surcharge assumes the obligation to pay such surcharge. The County may assign the surcharge lien to the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator.
- (B) Calculation. The surcharge for a Clean Energy Loan shall include the Clean Energy Loan Obligation and any administrative costs incurred by the County which shall be the actual expenses incurred to administer the program.
- (C) Notice of Levy and Lien of Surcharge. Upon receiving written notice from the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator of the execution of a Clean Energy Loan Financing Agreement, THE PROPERTY OWNER SHALL EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH THE COUNTY AND THE CLEAN ENERGY LENDER THAT WILL BE RECORDED IN THE LAND RECORDS OF KENT COUNTY. Kent County shall promptly file the notice of levy and lien of surcharge in the Land Records, thereby providing notice to third parties. Such notice shall contain:
 - (1) The date the Clean Energy Loan was made to the property owner and the property became subject to the surcharge;
 - (2) The term of the Clean Energy Loan and over which the surcharge will apply to the property;
 - (3) The Clean Energy Loan Obligation and estimated County administrative costs for the

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first year;

- (4) The annual principal and interest amount for each year of the term of the Clean Energy Loan, including any partial year prorated amounts;
- (5) Prepayment requirements and any prepayment premium that may apply to a prepayable Clean Energy Loan;
- (6) Notice that the Clean Energy Loan Obligation and the County's administrative costs will be repaid through a surcharge included on the **PROPERTY** owner's real property tax bill due and payable on the same date as the real property tax bill;
- (7) Notice that an unpaid Clean Energy Loan surcharge constitutes a first lien on the property that has priority over prior or subsequent liens in favor of private parties and that the surcharge will continue as a lien on the property from the date it becomes payable until the unpaid surcharge and interest and penalties on the surcharge are paid in full, regardless of a change in ownership of the property, whether voluntary or involuntary; and
- (8) Notice that if payments of surcharges are not timely paid, the surcharge will be collectible as a tax lien through the tax sale process authorized under Tax-Property Article, Title 14, Subtitle 8 of the ANNOTATED State Code OF MARYLAND and in accordance with THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF KENT COUNTY, MARYLAND §152-4 and that an overdue surcharge will be so collected, irrespective of whether real property taxes (or any other taxes, charges, or assessments) are due and owing.
- (D) Default. In the event of default on the Clean Energy Loan surcharge, the County shall be required to collect the lien pursuant to **THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF KENT COUNTY**, **MARYLAND** §152-4, irrespective of whether property taxes (or any other taxes, charges, or assessments) are due and owning. The County shall not incur any liability to the Clean Energy Lender or others in the event of default.
- (E) Payment to Clean Energy Lender. The County shall have no ownership of the surcharges collected except for administrative costs provided under this subtitle. The Controller shall pay all surcharge payments in any calendar month to the applicable Clean Energy Lender or the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator within **THIRTY** (30) days after the end of the month in which such amounts are collected. The County shall have no obligation to make payments to any Clean Energy Lender with respect to any Clean Energy Loan Obligation other than that portion of surcharge actually collected from a property owner for the repayment of a Clean Energy Loan. Payments received from a property owner shall be credited first to all County taxes, assessments, and charges.

§152-32. Financing.

- (A) CLEAN ENERGY LENDERS, TERMS. Clean Energy Loans may be provided by any private lender and a Clean Energy Financing Agreement may contain any terms agreed to by the Clean Energy Lender and the property owner, as permitted by law, for the financing of Clean Energy Loans. The County may not finance or fund any loan under the program, shall serve only as a program sponsor to facilitate loan repayment by including the surcharge on the County real property tax bill for the property, and shall incur no liability for the loan. THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN MUST BE REPAID OVER A TERM NOT TO EXCEED THE USEFUL LIFE OF THE PROJECT AS DETERMINED BY THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM.
- (B) COUNTY ROLE. THE COUNTY'S ROLE IN THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM IS LIMITED TO SPONSORING THE PROGRAM AND COLLECTING AND FORWARDING THE SURCHARGES IMPOSED UNDER THE PROGRAM. THE COUNTY MAY NOT PROVIDE CLEAN ENERGY LOANS OR OTHER FINANCING IN CONNECTION WITH THE CLEAN ENERGY LOAN PROGRAM.

SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, that Maryland Clean Energy Center and its designee are hereby authorized and directed to serve as the Clean Energy Loan Program Administrator under the terms of a separate agreement.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> **BE IT FURTHER ENACTED**, That this Act shall apply to any commercial property for which a Clean Energy Loan was financed on or after October 20, 2016.

SECTION 4. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED by the County Commissioners of Kent County that this

Act shall take effect on the 4th day of October	, 2024.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT BETWEEN STATE OF MARYLAND AND KENT COUNTY, MARYLAND

This Community Partnership Agreement ("Agreement") effective, as of July 1, 2024, between the State of Maryland ("State"), acting by and through the Children's Cabinet ("Cabinet"); and Kent County, Maryland ("Subdivision"), acting by and through the Kent County Local Management Board ("Board"), designated as the Local Management Board by the Subdivision pursuant to Section 8-301 of the Human Services Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland.

WHEREAS, the Cabinet and the Board intend to enter into a partnership to develop a more comprehensive integration of children and family services and the funding for these services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 8, Subtitle 5 of the Human Services Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the **Board** has made an application for money from the **Cabinet** Fund, and desires to enter into a Community Partnership Agreement that: (1) reflects coordination with the State's three-year plan for children, youth, and families and any local government plan for services for children, youth, and families; and (2) addresses the priorities and strategies of the Subdivision for meeting the identified needs of children, youth and families as articulated in the **Board's** community plan; and,

WHEREAS, the Cabinet intends to disburse Cabinet funds to the Board subject to certain terms, conditions, performance measures, or outcome evaluations that the Cabinet considers necessary,

Now Therefore, for good and valuable consideration, the sufficiency of which is acknowledged by both parties, the parties hereto agree as follows:

I. SCOPE

The purpose of this **Agreement** is to establish a Community Partnership Agreement in **Kent County, Maryland** to establish a comprehensive, integrated children and family interagency service delivery system that is community-based, family-focused and culturally competent. This **Agreement** is based on a shared vision and a joint commitment by the **Cabinet** and the **Board** to advance a results-based accountability and management system that enhances child and family well-being.

This **Agreement** includes Appendices A and B, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein. The appendices that are attached and incorporated into this **Agreement** are as follows:

- 1. Appendix A, Program Description Chart, which sets forth the details of the programs/strategies to be funded in whole or in part by the **Cabinet** and managed by the **Board** under this **Agreement**, for the fiscal year; and
- 2. Appendix B, which contains the annual budget for **Cabinet-funded** programs/strategies, Board Administration, and Community Support.

II. PROGRAMS AND SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED

A. The programs, services, requirements, conditions and other activities of the **Board** as to its operations that will be funded by the **Cabinet** are set forth in the Appendices A and B. By

accepting **Cabinet** funds under this **Agreement**, the **Board** agrees to the terms and conditions set forth herein and appended hereto and those contained in the State of Maryland Policies and Procedures Manual for Local Management Boards ("Manual"), which is incorporated by reference into this **Agreement** in accordance with paragraph VIII (H) herein.

- B. The **Board** shall comply with applicable provisions of Title 8 of the Human Services Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland; the Code of Maryland Regulations ("COMAR"); written guidelines and policies communicated in writing and issued by the **Cabinet** and the Special Secretary for the **Governor's Office for Children ("Office")**; and other applicable federal and State laws, regulations, and policies relating to the terms and conditions of this **Agreement**, including the delivery of services to children and families described herein.
- C. The parties hereby expressly acknowledge the possibility of substantial changes in State and federal regulations applicable to this **Agreement** and expressly agree to negotiate associated amendments to the **Agreement** as necessary to comply with such changes; provided that any increase in the scope of work or cost of performance associated with such amendments may be compensated by a budget increase or, in the alternative, by modifying the scope of work to reduce the cost of performance, as determined by the **Cabinet** in its sole discretion. Any such modification in the scope of work or budget shall be performed in accordance with the provisions of this **Agreement** (see Section V "Modifications").

III. TERM

This **Agreement** shall be effective and remain in full force and effect for State fiscal year 2025 (July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025) unless modified or terminated under Sections V. ("MODIFICATIONS") and VI. ("TERMINATION") herein, and unless renewed thereafter upon the mutual written agreement of the parties.

IV. FUNDING

A. <u>Amount:</u> Funding for the programs/strategies to be provided by the **Board** under this **Agreement** will be provided by the **Cabinet**. The total amount will be determined by the **Office** on behalf of the **Cabinet**, based on the proposed budget submitted by the **Board** and approved by the **Office** on behalf of the **Cabinet**, and which is subject to annual **State** appropriations.

B. Conditions:

- Funding received from the Cabinet is conditioned upon the availability of State
 appropriations. The Board shall make every effort to maximize revenue from
 sources other than State appropriations. In the event of a funding reduction,
 the Subdivision shall not be required to utilize Subdivision funds to meet the
 objectives of this Agreement.
- 2. Funding received from the **Cabinet** is conditioned upon the **Board** complying with the conditions as set forth in this **Agreement**, including Appendices A and B.
- 3. Funding received from the **Cabinet** is conditioned on the submission by the **Board** of an annual budget that has been approved by the **Cabinet**.

- 4. Funding received from the **Cabinet** is conditioned on the submission by the **Board** of performance measures for each funded program/strategy noted in Appendix A in accordance with the instructions established by the **Cabinet**.
- Funding received from the Cabinet is conditioned on the utilization by the Board of the Results Scorecard web-based application for each funded program/strategy noted in Appendix A in accordance with the instructions established by the Office.
- C. <u>Payments</u>: Payments from the **Cabinet** Fund pursuant to this **Agreement** shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the Manual.
- D. Withholding and Repayment of Funds:
 - 1. The **Cabinet** reserves the right to withhold the transfer of **Cabinet** funds to the **Board** if the **Board** fails to:
 - a) Comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including any and all Children's Cabinet reporting requirements; and/or,
 - b) Implement the programs/strategies listed in Appendix A in accordance with the terms and conditions of this **Agreement**.
 - 2. Before any funds are withheld hereunder, the Cabinet shall notify the Board in writing of the provision(s) of the Agreement that the Board failed to follow. The Board shall have thirty (30) calendar days from receipt of the Cabinet notice to develop a corrective plan acceptable to the Cabinet. This corrective plan shall specify the date by which deficiencies will be corrected. Failure by the Board to correct deficiencies shall result in withholding of funds hereunder by the Cabinet.
 - 3. Any funds not expended during the fiscal year shall be returned to the Children's Cabinet Fund in accordance with Manual requirements or as directed by the Children's Cabinet.

V. MODIFICATIONS

No amendment or modification to this **Agreement** is binding unless it is in writing and signed by all parties, except as specifically provided in the Manual.

VI. TERMINATION

- A. This **Agreement** may be terminated by the **Cabinet**, upon sixty (60) calendar days written notice, if the **Board** fails to fulfill its obligations under the **Agreement** as determined by the **Cabinet** in its sole discretion, or if termination is determined by the **Cabinet** in its sole discretion to be in the best interest of the **Cabinet**. The **Subdivision** or the **Board** may terminate the **Agreement**, upon sixty (60) calendar days written notice, if that is determined to be in the best interest of the **Subdivision** or the **Board**. The **Cabinet** shall pay the cost of budgeted expenditures made prior to the date of termination that are consistent with the terms of this **Agreement** and the **Board** Manual.
- B. If the Cabinet determines that the Agreement, or any portion thereof, must be terminated

due to a lack of appropriations or other reductions to the **Cabinet** Fund, the provisions of the above paragraph A. do not apply. In such circumstances, the **Cabinet** will attempt to provide prior notice of termination and payment for allowable budgeted expenditures prior to the date of termination, to the extent feasible.

C. Termination of this Agreement does not relieve the Subdivision of the requirements of Section 8-301 of the Human Services Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland requiring the establishment of a Local Management Board. Prior to termination of this Agreement, the Subdivision and the Board shall adopt and implement a transition plan, subject to approval by the Cabinet, to ensure the continuation of programs and services under this Agreement through a State or local entity. However, if the Cabinet terminates this Agreement due to a lack of appropriations or other reductions to the Cabinet Fund, then the Subdivision and the Board may be relieved of all obligations to continue the programs and services required under this Agreement if substitute funding cannot be obtained. Termination under this Paragraph C shall occur in accordance with the provisions of the Manual.

VII. REVIEW PROCESS

The **Board** may request a review of any decision made by or on behalf of the **Cabinet** with respect to this **Agreement**. The request must be made in writing to the Director of Community Initiatives of the **Office** within thirty (30) calendar days of the decision. The Director of Community Initiatives for the **Office** will respond, in writing, within sixty (60) calendar days of the date of the **Board** request. A request for review of the Director of Community Initiatives' response may be made, in writing, to the **Cabinet** or its designee within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of the Director of Community Initiatives' response.

VIII. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND CONDITIONS

- A. <u>State Laws and Regulations</u>: The terms of this **Agreement** and its execution, interpretation, and enforcement shall be governed by and are subject to all applicable Maryland laws and regulations and approval of other agencies of the **State**, as required under said laws and regulations.
- B. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>: This **Agreement** shall bind the respective agents, successors and assigns of the parties.
- C. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>: The **Board** shall comply with applicable nondiscrimination provisions of federal and Maryland laws and regulations.
- D. <u>Anti-Bribery</u>: The **Board** certifies that, to the best of its knowledge, neither the **Board** nor any of its officers, directors, partners, nor any of its employees directly involved in obtaining this **Agreement** with the **State** or any county, city, or other subdivision of the State, has been convicted of bribery, attempted bribery, or conspiracy to bribe under the laws of any state or the United States.
- E. It is understood and agreed that the parties to this **Agreement** do not waive any rights they may have to assert governmental or sovereign immunity.
- F. The **State** shall not assume any obligation to indemnify, hold harmless, or pay attorneys' fees that may arise from or in any way be associated with the performance or operation of this **Agreement**.

- G. In the event that monies designated by the United States Department of Health and Human Services for programs under Title IV-A, IV-B, and IV-E of the Social Security Act, as amended, are used in programs provided for under this **Agreement**, the Maryland Department of Human Services, as the Single State Agency for Title IV-A, IV-B, and IV-E funding, retains all decision-making authority which it held as of the date of this **Agreement** for purposes of implementation of any such program. Similarly, if any services provided under this Agreement are funded by Medicaid, under Title XX of the Social Security Act, then the Maryland Department of Health, as the Single State Agency for administration of the Medicaid Program, retains decision-making authority with respect to those funds, to the extent required by 42 U.S.C., Section 1902(a)(5) and 42 CFR 431.10, as amended.
- H. <u>Incorporation by Reference:</u> The provisions of the Manual effective as of July 1, 2021 and amended from time to time, are incorporated herein by reference. The **Board** shall incorporate the Manual by reference into any and all of its subcontracts funded by the **Cabinet** pursuant to this **Agreement**, as appropriate.



FY2025 Quarterly Report: For the first quarter of the Fiscal Year (July, August, and September), Inspector Pearsall conducted routine inspections of fifty-seven (57) out of fifty-nine (59)alcohol establishments. Inspector Pearsall could not conduct inspections for two (2) establishments because she could not make contact with members of the establishments who would allow her to do so. No violations were observed at any of the establishments during these inspections.

The KATE team continues to look for responsible 18 to 20 ½-year-olds for compliance checks on tobacco retailers, as well as responsible 21 to 27-year-olds to be "Mystery Shoppers" who will use the yellow and green cards to check alcohol establishments for compliance, making sure they are asking for Identification from their patrons.
